In the UK, Christmas is all about spending time with family or the people closest to you. Most families have a Christmas tree and decorate it and the house. Plants like mistletoe, ivy and holly are brought into the home. Children hang stockings for Santa Claus to put presents in and opened on Christmas day. Italy

Russia

In Russia, Christmas is celebrated on January 7th and is sometimes known as the winter festival. Some people will fast (not eat anything) on January 6th until the first star appears in the sky and then they will eat the traditional meal of sochivo, which is a type of porridge.

Germany



A lot of Christmas traditions that have been adopted in other countries come from Germany. Advent calendars are very important; some may contain chocolates and others may have boxes of presents in instead. Christmas Eve is the main day when many Germans open their presents.





France

In France, Nativity scenes are very popular. Many towns and cities would have a nativity scene for the people to come and see. Santa is called Père Noël. In Eastern France he travels with Le Pere Fouettard, who punishes the naughty children.

China
